

It gives me immense pleasure to share with you the 35th Annual Report of North East Diocesan Social Service Society (NEDSSS). At the outset, I extend my sincere gratitude to all our past and ongoing supporters for believing in us, to provide services to the people of Northeast India in the field of peace building and conflict resolution, health care services focusing on mother and child, education support to the children, emergency relief assistance to the displaced, flood and landslide affected people in different parts of the Northeast. These support services have addressed and tailored their unique needs.

The year had been eventful and momentous with many achievements to be highlighted. Through health project, we were able to reach out to 45,552 pregnant women and children, including referred cases for treatment to different hospitals. Through peace project, 26,019 youth, village leaders, SHG members were trained on peace building skills, research skills and mediation and leadership. Through education project, 2300 children were provided with free tuition classes. 3770 parents were sensitized on the importance of education. 153 dropouts are enrolled in formal schools and 23 children's parliaments are formed. Through emergency response project, we were able to reach out to 4,306 people affected by natural calamities.

Going forward, NEDSSS believes that creating awareness, providing health services, and promoting inclusive development are crucial steps towards helping the marginalized community to come out of their situations in this part of Northeast India.

We sincerely thank all the donor agencies, General and Governing Body members and staff, and acknowledge them for their incredible generosity and ongoing support. Your continuous support enables us to continue our invaluable work with the most vulnerable children and communities living in the North-eastern region, and build sustainable future for the region.

Improving Access to Comprehensive Maternal and Child Health Services; and for Diseases/ Conditions of District level Importance

The project is implemented across five states i.e. Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram with a total of 16 districts and 31 health centres across 254 villages.

The project aim at improving the quality of maternal and child health services in the target villages and Improving the access to and quality of primary health care services among the target group for prevention and treatment of district specific diseases.

Empowering Communities and Institutions for Peace Building in Northeast India

There have been different forms of violence in the North East. In order to minimize the violence, the project build the capacity of individuals and institutions through different activities so that communities living in North East India with focus on 23 districts of Assam, Manipur, Nagaland and Tripura will take steps towards reconciliation through mutual respect, reduced violence, confidence-building measures and building bridges of trust in each other.

108 peace clubs are formed in schools and are functioning

45 SHG and youth groups have been formed and collaborating in addressing issues of peace at the village level

30 peace committees have been formed and are functioning in resolving issues in villages of Manipur and KarbiAnglong, Assam

1704 opinion shapers of the network of NEDSSS such as NGOs and CSOs came together to promote peace and prevent conflict

4291 community leaders have built their capacity on peacebuilding and conflict resolution knowledge, skills and techniques and are using the learning in their respective field of work

6818 members of peace committees, SHGs and youth clubs have been empowered on peace education and related issues

3756 community members have come together to approiate and celebrate cultural diversity and respect for differences through observation of importance days like internanal peace day, women's day, environment day etc.

33273 children have been capacitated on peacebuilding and conflict transformation and related topics for self-awareness and promotion among their peers and surroundings.

Reduction of Child Labour in the Tea Garden Areas of Assam



The project aims at reducing dropouts in the project villages by providing free tuitions and life skills sessions for a behavioural change to address a balance of four areas-knowledge, attitude, values and skills. Parents of the children and community leaders are sensitized on the importance of education and care and protection for the children.

Suraksha: Strengthening Child Trafficking Prevention Pathways



Through focused efforts in one Panchayat in Golaghat district, the project seeks to create a protective environment for these children, reducing their vulnerability to traffickers. The vulnerability to trafficking will be reduced by engaging at the level of child, family, community and the system including the gram panchayats and the child protection system.

160 life skills sessions are conducted for 185 children of vulnerable families belonging to Nepali and Adivasi tribes. Children are beginning to benefit from life skills sessions, which encourages them to take on responsibility and leadership roles. These activities are helping them develop problem-solving skills and fostering a sense of discipline, care, and concern for their peers.

178 Parents from socio-economically marginalized backgrounds were invited and 112 started to attend parenting sessions, which helped them to understand their children's emotional and psychological needs. This early engagement is leading to improved relationships between parents and children. 55 parents have expressed a newfound awareness of effective parenting practices and a willingness to implement what they have learned

102 Sports sessions was conducted for 185 children in four villages. Sports sessions encouraged and helped children to come together putting aside their differences. Strengthened bonding and relationship and stay informed about each other. Developed children's self-confidence and self-esteem.

A child named **Thuanimei Rongme**i from Ramgaizang village from Cachar district, Assam was diagnosed with malnutrition and underweight during a home visit by our Village Health Worker (VHW). The MUAC of the child was 12.2 cm and weight 9 kg. The VHW inquired about the caused of the child's malnutrition and learned that the child had a tongue infection when the child was 6 months old. Due to which the mother couldn't breastfeed for a while. VHW advised the parents to take care of the child in terms of feeding nutritious food and maintain hygiene. VHW and the supervisor made regular visits to the child and gave vitamin A drops, iron syrup and ORS. After seven months the child was re-examined and his health was improved. The MUAC of the child was 15 cm and weight 14 kg. VHW advised the parents to take care of their child's health in future. The parents thanked VHW and NEDSSS for showing how to take care of their child.

Mrs. Kache Beypi from Bibia Pai village of Karbi Anglong district was 3 months pregnant when she came for the health camp conducted by NEDSSS at Rongmongve Health Centre. She was found to be very anaemic and with high blood pressure. Our Village Health Worker took her to Tezpur medical college for further treatment where she was given blood and other medication in the medical college. When she came back home the health workers together with ANM visited her and educate her about the health care routine. She was given IFA and TT1 along with regular follow up and nutrition. She also completed her 4 ANC due to which her health improved slowly and she had a normal delivery. Both the mother and the child are safe.







Smriti Orang

Smriti Orang is a 10-year-old, class 7 dropout from Betalai TE No. 6 Line village. She had to drop out of school 3 years back when both her parents passed away. She went to live with her unmarried aunt who was economically poor and unable to send Smriti to school.

But with the setting up of a tuition centre by NEDSS in the village and regular home visits by project animator, there was complete change of mindset. When initial contact was made by animator, Smriti was of the view that education is not important at all. She, in fact, believed that in order to live a good life, only economic stability was needed. She thought she could achieve this even without going to school. Regular visit and counselling on importance of education by the animator have brought cognitive changes in her and her aunty. Later, she agreed to go to the tuition centre. Even her aunty asured that she will provide all possible ways to let her continue her study.

Robina Pradhan is a 14 years old girl studying in class 6 from Amchong Tea Estate. She lost her father and her mother is hospitalized. So, she used to stay with her Sister in-law in the house. But her brother and sister-in law being alcoholic and drinks everyday and did not create for her a conducive environment. Due to the family environment she was not able to study properly and she stopped going to school and moved to another Tea Estate to her married sister's house. After knowing the news our project Animator intervened and approached her brother and sister in-law and explained about the need to take care of her and the importance of education. With the advice of our Animator they were ready to bring her back to Amchong Tea Estate and send her to school. She is now going to school and participating in all the activities that the project is offering for the children. Her brother and Sister in-law are creating a good environment for her study.
